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A. News from OCPA

Activities of the Executive Director and members of the OCPA Secretariat

The month of April will have been a period of various negotiations with established partners and others who are on the way.

A.1 Talks with officials from the Addis Ababa office of the SELAM program

The Executive Director of OCPA had a first meeting with Mr. Teshome Wondimu, the Director and Mrs. Lucy Ilado, the Regional Director for the program of SELAM, an organization established with the assistance of the Swedish Arts Council in Addis Ababa to support the preservation of the creative freedom of artists around the world. The exchanges focused on the assistance desired for the establishment of a partnership of this association in Mozambique and the participation of the cultural actors of the country, after a dozen other African countries, in the implementation of the project PANAF.

A.2 Online meeting on the European initiative "Global Cultural Relations"

A second online meeting took place with Mr. Thierry d'Anna from the Institut Français, on a European initiative, Global Cultural Relations, with a view to a possible participation of OCPA in the planned reflections.

A.3 Online meeting with Open Society in South Africa - OSISA

The third online meeting took place with Mrs. Elfia Elesse of the OSISA Organization on organizing various cultural programs into a regional entity called OSF-Africa monitoring the Culture sector and its projects. The exchange aimed to obtain additional elements to the discussions already initiated on this development, in particular to identify a framework for presenting research and field projects to an expected funding program.

A.4 Cooperation with the ACP-EU Programme Culture-Creating in Central Africa

The ACP-EU Program Culture-Creating in Central Africa, which has associated OCPA with the promotion of the initiative, has announced the launch of its second Call for proposals, the deadline of which is June 6, 2022. In addition to the promotion of 'Call the Observatory encourages cultural entrepreneurs in the Region deemed eligible to participate in the submission of relevant projects.

A.5 OCPA and the first AU Consultation on Arts Education

Finally, OCPA was invited to take part in the first African Union Consultation on the Arts Education program in order to prepare a common strategy for the Continent in this essential file to ensure a complete training of African youth. and the continuity of creativity. Lupwishi Mbuyamba, the Executive Director, and Hamadou Mande, the Deputy Research Coordinator were responsible for representing OCPA at this meeting on April 29 and 30 in Lusaka, Zambia.

A.6 OCPA Publications

In relation with its research activities OCPA has produced some **25 books and publications** such as a strategy document (2004) and a research programme (2007 and 2010) on the cultural

indicators of human development in Africa, a book on "African Musics – New Stakes and New Challenges" (with UNESCO, 2005), the Observatory's 1st and 2nd Medium Term Strategy and Plan of Action (2006 and 2011), the Compendium of basic reference texts for cultural policies in Africa (E/F/S, 2006 and 2009), the Guidelines for the Design and Evaluation of National Cultural Policies in Africa (2008 an 2009). The Proceedings of the International Symposium on Policies, Strategies and Experiences in Financing Culture in Africa was published in 2010, the Manual for Training Specialist of Cultural Policy and Management in Africa and the book on the Contribution of Culture to Poverty reduction in Africa were produced in 2013. More recently, in 2019, OCPA published with the support of UNESCO a book entitled Intercultural and Interreligious Dialogue: An African Experience as well as the book prepared and published with the support of Africalia on "Anticipating Cultural Policies in Africa by 2030".

B. News, events and projects in Africa

B.1 East Africa: Renewed AU-UNESCO Campaign for Kiswahili

The renewed push for Kiswahili to become a lingua franca in Africa promises to benefit the continent and the world. The effort, set to reduce Africa's reliance on foreign languages in official communications, is meant to lead to the recognition of Kiswahili, and to the promotion of Pan-Africanism.

Today, of the 54 countries on the continent, English is the official language in 27 and French is the official language in 21 countries. Both are languages of former colonizers. Their continued use attracts funding and other benefits from these countries.

For Kiswahili to gain acceptance and develop in such regions, adequate resources and political goodwill -- including financial and economic inputs - are imperative to ensure it will serve people as well as, if not better than, the languages they speak today.

For Kiswahili to grow globally, joint effort is needed. Kiswahili's recognition by AU and UNESCO is a step in the right direction proposed by the Campaign for Kiswahili.

B.2 Gambia: New UNESCO Funded Project for Strengthening National Capacities for Safeguarding Intangible Cultural Heritage

On the 1st of April, the National Centre for Arts and Culture (NCAC) launched a two year project on 'Strengthening National Capacities for Safeguarding Intangible Cultural Heritage and Contributing to Sustainable Development in The Gambia.', aimed at establishing an inventory of The Gambia's intangible cultural heritage across the country.

NCAC will work in the seven regions of the country to research, list, photograph the myriad Gambian rituals, ceremonies, oral traditions, performing arts, social practices, rituals, festive events, knowledge and practices concerning nature and the universe or the knowledge and skills to produce traditional crafts.

This Inventory will be published as a reference tool for Gambian heritage and it will help to strengthen partnerships for sustainable development at the national level.

B.4 Second edition of the "Create in Central Africa" program

This, with the aim of increasing economic revenue from the creative sector, sustainably promoting the creation of jobs related to the cultural sector as well as better accessibility, recognition and enhancement of Central African artists and their works.

Thus, can benefit from this programme implemented by Interarts, Culture and Development, the Economic Community of Central African States and the National Institute of the Arts. Arterial Network and United Local Governments of Africa are also associated partners of the project.

B.5 Côte d'Ivoire: FICAD - the 2022 edition is in line with government actions

By inaugurating the 17th edition of the International Festival of Culture and the Arts of Daoukro on April 9, Honorable Akoto Kouassi Olivier, Commissioner General of FICAD announced that this event is in line with the action of the government which aims to strengthen the economic dimension of culture and the arts through the new name of the ministry in charge of Culture.

He underlined that culture is both a factor of development and social cohesion and has neither political nor religious coloring. "Today, through FICAD, it is Côte d'Ivoire in all its diversity that magnifies the beauty of arts and culture. This is a strong contribution on our part to the promotion of reconciliation and peace." he said.

He revealed that the FICAD, causes 500 temporary jobs offered to young people in the region for a week, with 100,000 festival-goers to the delight of the receptive hoteliers, restaurateurs and various businesses.

B.6 Tunisia: 2nd edition of the International Festival of Theater in the Desert

It is in the village of Bishni, in Kebili, that the 2nd edition of this theatrical event in the Sahara was successfully held. The decentralization of art remains a priority for the organizing team, in addition to the promotion of the cultural sector in the regions, specifically in disadvantaged areas. Reviving domestic tourism and introducing locals to theater remain equally important. This 2nd session saw 28 performances from different countries such as Tunisia, Kurdistan, Morocco and Italy.

The program also included a puppet-making workshop, an international scientific symposium and training sessions. This mini-festival of the Sahara responded to the vision of the organizers: that of creating by diversifying the content and in new spaces other than in traditional places such as closed theaters.

C. News about cultural policies, institutions and resources in Africa

C.1 Ghana Seeks Reparation of Stolen Cultural Heritage, Artifacts

A 22-member committee to lead Ghana's quest to seek reparation and restitution of trafficked cultural heritage and artifacts has been inaugurated in Accra. Chaired by Professor Kodzo Gavua, Department of Archaeology and Heritage Studies, the committee would identify researchers to elicit data that would support the government's call for restitution and reparation.

Speaking at the meeting, Deputy Minister of Tourism, Arts and Culture, Mark Okraku Mante, said Ghana was one of African countries which had its cultural materials illegally taken away by the colonial masters between the 15th and 20th centuries through looting, intimidation, and seizure, among others. Referring to historical data in February 1884, he noted that the British Forces invaded Kumasi and plundered countless valuable cultural objects. Many of the illicitly

trafficked materials, he said, had been sent to the British Museum, University of Oxford's Pitt Rivers Museum and other museums across Western Europe.

Restitution would help in repairing the damage that the actions of the colonial masters caused. Ghana will work with other African nations to form a strong voice in pushing for their demands.

C.2 Monitoring meeting on the projects of the Moroccan Ministry of Youth, Culture and Communication

The Minister of Youth, Culture and Communication, Mohamed Mehdi Bensaid and the Wali of the Casablanca-Settat region and governor of the prefecture of Casablanca, Said Ahmidouche held a meeting focused on monitoring the ministry's projects in the Casablanca-Settat region. This meeting was part of the High Royal Guidelines aimed at increasing efforts to achieve strategic development priorities.

On this occasion, he stressed the pioneering role that the cultural aspect must play, particularly that linked to heritage, in sectors such as tourism, calling for efforts to create cultural animation through the creation of cultural enterprises. and the encouragement of cultural cooperatives.

This meeting was marked by a presentation by the governor of Casablanca on the rehabilitation projects of the historic sites of the city. These projects are part of agreements signed before HM King Mohammed VI for an envelope of 232.5 million dirhams, and aim to enhance the cultural heritage of the economic capital of the Kingdom, by mobilizing the various external services, institutions elected representatives, as well as the services of the Ministry.

C.3 Angola: Minister assesses Art and Culture Foundation projects

Luanda — The Minister of Culture, Tourism and Environment, Filipe Zau traveled to the island of Luanda to learn about the artistic and cultural projects of the Art and Culture Foundation constituting the four pillars of the foundation: education through the arts, the foundation as a cultural centre, social enterprise and the social sector.

Through the Cultural Center, the foundation offers families cultural environments - concerts, cinema every Wednesday, theater with the Youth of Mulemba. "More than 400 children attend our schools. We have opened our amphitheater, named after the late musician Wyza, to people looking for a space to carry out their activities," the official said.

The Art and Culture Foundation is an integral part of the Menomadin Foundation International Global Impact Foundation and a social responsibility contribution of the Mitrelli Group. It was founded on Luanda City Day, January 25, 2006.

C.4 Morocco: Culture, an essential lever for the development of territories and regions (President of the ICC/CGEM federation)

"A quality cultural offer is synonymous with a country's influence, just as it promotes the promotion of an entire ecosystem of professions", she explained, adding that with the adoption of a "strategy for the cultural and creative industries, very perceptible spin-offs will be there".

C.6 Morocco: Essaouira, pilot city for UNESCO's cultural indicators of the 2030 program Essaouira

"It is Essaouira that will embody for Morocco, the place, the role and the centrality of Culture in the United Nations 2030 program for sustainable development", declared Mr. André Azoulay, Adviser to HM the King and Founding President of the Essaouira-Mogador Association who spoke in Essaouira in the context of a follow-up seminar (March 31 to April 1) around the thematic indicators set up by UNESCO to assess the contribution of culture to the achievement of the sustainable development goals of UN by 2030.

Reinforced by the national and international validation of its strategy and by the possibility now given to it by the Ministry of Culture and UNESCO to scientifically measure its achievements, lessons learned and weaknesses, civil society Souirie de la Cité des Alizés got down to the definition of a 2030 roadmap which will privilege the role of "Culture in the reconquest of a

universality reconciled with the respect, the legitimacy and the richness of all its diversities", explained the Advisor to HM the King.

This workshop, whose work ended on Friday, was thus an opportunity to nurture and highlight the legitimacy of the selection of Essaouira as the city that best embodies these UNESCO cultural indicators of 2030 program.

D.2 International Arts Education Week (May 23-29, 2022)

The decision of the 36th session of UNESCO's General Conference in 2011, this week was proclaimed as the International Arts Education Week.

Art is an basic component of a comprehensive education for the full development of the individual. The skills, values and behaviours promoted by arts education are more paramount than ever. These competencies - creativity, collaboration, and imaginative problem solving – develop resiliency, nurture appreciation of cultural diversity and freedom of expressions, and cultivate innovation and critical thinking skills.

Art brings us closer together. A painting, an artefact, a piece of ancestral music speaks volumes about the history of civilizations and the ties that bind them. It makes us to feel and to understand what unites humanity in the diversity of its cultures and expressions and thus contributing to our sustainable future.

UNESCO is committed to joining forces with its Member States to step up cooperation, mobilizing civil society, educators and arts professionals to fully harness the potential of both culture and education.

D.3 UNESCO awards \$600,000 to strengthen the status of the artist (15 April)

On the World Art Day, UNESCO is announcing concrete action in support of artists and culture professionals worldwide via the UNESCO-Aschberg programme. Over US\$ 600,000 will go to the following Member States to improve the status of the artist and promote artistic freedom: Cabo Verde, Costa Rica, Gambia, Indonesia, Madagascar, Mozambique, Palestine, Peru, Romania, Seychelles, Tunisia and Uganda. This will support the strengthening of national

legislation and policies, capacity building on artistic freedom, monitoring the social and economic rights of the artists and advancing advocacy.

UNESCO received 108 project proposals following a call in September 2021. Projects were evaluated, with priority given to Africa and Small Island Developing States, as well as projects focused on youth and gender equality.

D.4 Message from Ms Audrey Azoulay, Director-General of UNESCO, on the occasion of World Art Day – 15 April 2022

"Just as man needs oxygen to survive, he also needs art and poetry." These words by Aimé Césaire remind us how vital art and culture are to humanity.

This World Day is a timely reminder that art can connect us even in the most difficult of circumstances. Indeed, the power of art to bring people together, to inspire, heal and share, has become increasingly clear during recent conflicts and crises, including COVID-19.

Indeed, in a sector where employment is often informal and unstable, and in the absence of an appropriate social safety net, artists and culture professionals too often find themselves vulnerable in the face of the loss of income brought on by crises and conflicts. This shows us just how much we need to accord artists appropriate status, as urged by UNESCO's 1980 Recommendation concerning the Status of the Artist, in order to bolster respect for their rights and boost the resilience of arts and culture.

The challenge of keeping art alive is twofold: we must support culture professionals and cultural institutions, and promote access to art for all. In order to better identify priority needs, we must listen to the voices of the art world in all their diversity. This is the aim of UNESCO's ResiliArt movement, which was launched to affirm the resilience of art and prepare for the future.

The challenges we face today can only be met through far-reaching cultural policies aimed at helping creative communities overcome this crisis and protecting and improving the status of artists. The UNESCO World Conference on Cultural Policies and Sustainable Development – MONDIACULT ensure that the voices of artists and civil society are fully heard as countries set the agenda for culture for the years to come.

D.5 Message from Ms Audrey Azoulay, Director-General of UNESCO, for World Book and Copyright Day 23 April 2022

Books have long embodied the human capacity to conjure up worlds, both real and imagined, giving voice to the diversity of human experience. They help us share ideas, obtain information and inspire admiration for different cultures, enabling far-reaching forms of dialogue between people across space and time.

The potential of books to advance individual fulfilment and create social change is undeniable. In the words of renowned Nigerian author Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie: "To choose to write is to reject silence.

"This is why UNESCO is resolutely committed to promoting access to books and reading – for example, through our World Book Capital programme. In 2022, the Mexican city of Guadalajara is taking up the mantle of World Book Capital, with a year-long programme that

focuses on the role of books and reading in triggering social change, combatingviolence and building a culture of peace. Despite the importance of books in sustaining social wellbeing, the publishing industry is currently facing major upheavals — most notably the digital transformation. These challenges became all too clear during COVID-19, when falling revenues amplified the vulnerability of authors and book sellers, like other creative professionals across the value chain. Cultural diversity was also threatened as the number of titles publishedineluctably diminished.

In uncertain times, we must cherish and defend books as symbols of hope and dialogue.

This means standing in solidarity with the professionals who disseminate our literary heritage – writers, editors, publishers and translators. As they build bridges across continents and cultures, these professionals must be protected, and their value acknowledged. UNESCO is firmly committed to this goal. At a time when digital technology is changing the face of the publishing industry, we advocate for the fair remuneration of authors and the protection of cultural diversity. We support the work of publishers through undertakings such as partnerships with the International Authors Forum, the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions, and the International Publishers Association.

On World Book and Copyright Day, I call upon all of UNESCO's partners to share the message that books are a force to address contemporary challenges, to understand political and economic realities, and to combat inequalities and misinformation. Storytelling is an incredibly effective tool when it comes to educating younger generations. Indeed, books are vital vehicles to access, transmit and promote education, science, culture and information worldwide. For this reason, every year, on 23 April – a date that marks the departure of three great authors of universal literature, Miguel de Cervantes, William Shakespeare, and Inca Garcilaso de la Vega – we celebrate their power to spark innovation, generate knowledge and change minds.

Mauritius: Prime Minister Inaugurates the Matisse Exhibition at the Blue Penny Museum

The Blue Penny Museum is displaying, from April 15 to June 11 2022, the works of the famous French painter Henri Matisse. In his address, the Prime Minister lauded the Blue Penny Museum for proposing such a high-profile cultural event in Mauritius. F.1 News from the International Federation of Arts Councils and Cultural Agencies (IFACCA – ACORNS)

Focus on Innovation and Vitality of the Arts and Culture Sector

In an increasingly complex and turbulent world, artists and cultural professionals bring much-needed vitality to support innovations that will, in turn, bring inspiration and reflection, as well as accelerate socio-economic development. This was amongst the key messages of the recently concluded **World Government Summit 2022** in the United Arab Emirates, which annually draws leaders from around the world to analyse how technology and other key drivers will change the future of governments and their ability to respond to accelerated changes. Culture as an indispensable driver for the realisation of development – in particular, the ambitious universal 2030 Agenda for sustainable development – was also strongly reiterated at **the**

Regional Consultation of Ministers of Culture for Latin America and the Caribbean this February. At this meeting, a call was made for debates about development at this time of global change to be broadened in order to better harness culture's transformative power.

As the United Nations' 2030 Agenda is firmly anchored in human rights, achieving the sustainable development goals needs to be done in a manner that protects the cultural rights of individuals, communities and groups of people. **UN Special Rapporteur in the field of cultural rights**, Ms. Alexandra Xanthaki is currently looking into this critical issue for her upcoming 2022 report to the General Assembly.

On the value of culture's transformative power, the Conference of Ministers of Culture organised by the Council of Europe and the Italian Ministry of Culture was held earlier this month with a central motif on the role of creativity and cultural heritage for empowering civil society, encouraging public debate and providing an education platform for democratic citizenship. At the heart of their concern is the crisis in Ukraine. The Ukrainian Minister of Culture and Information Policy Oleksandr Tkachenko highlighted not only the negative impact and damage incurred to Ukraine's cultural heritage and culture, but also how they are facing this with resilience and using their creative forces.

These recent discussions on culture in various international for reiterate the message of the UNESCO Global Report, Re|Shaping Policies for Creativity: that in these times of accelerated change, we urgently need the vitality of a cultural sector which nurtures both sustainable development and innovation. For this vitality to thrive, we must advance artistic freedom as a fundamental pillar of cultural policy. On 3 May, we will be releasing our Discussion Paper for the 9th World Summit on Arts and Culture which reflects on this concern. Please join us for the virtual public launch of our Discussion Paper on 10 May.

Zimbabwe's music strategy undergoes validation

Stakeholders in the creative sector gathered in the capital for the validation of the five-year National Music Strategy document crafted by the National Arts Council of Zimbabwe and sector partners drawn from the country's 10 provinces. The Middle East and North Africa is the music industry's fastest growing global market

A new report by the International Federation of the Phonographic Industry says the region is fulfilling its promise: The Middle East and North Africa is becoming a new powerhouse within the music industry. According to the Global Music Report 2022 by the International Federation of the Phonographic Industry, Mena experienced a 35 per cent growth in music revenues in 2021, establishing it as the world's fastest growing territory of that year. Coming second was the Latin American market which recorded a 31.2 per cent climb, followed by the US and Canada, Europe and Asia who all recorded increases in revenues in their respective markets. However, the buzz of the industry centres on Mena's rapid growth, largely powered through a combination of streaming consumption and a bigger regional push by major music companies.

These Fellowships aim to nurture wider and deeper connections among cultural workers within the Global South.
