The Executive Director went to Ouagadougou where he delivered the inauguration speech at the international conference organized at the Joseph Ki zerbo University on the theme of "Art and freedom" as part of the 19th edition of "FITMO", Ouagadougou International Theater and Puppet Festival.

A.4 Signature of the Framework Cooperation Agreement between CERAV and OCPA

At the closing ceremony took place the official and public signing of the Cooperation Framework Agreement between the Regional Center for Performing Arts in Africa (CERAV/Africa, Bobo Dioulasso, Burkina Faso, UNESCO category 2 Center) and OCPA. During the ceremony, OCPA made a donation of around ten of its publications to the CERAV library. CERAV was represented by its General Delegate, Mr. Herman Pouya.

A.5 Working session at the Gambidi Cultural Space

A.8 OCPA Publications

In relation with its research activities OCPA has produced some **25 books and publications** such as a strategy document (2004) and a research programme (2007 and 2010) on the cultural indicators of human development in Africa, a book on "African Musics – New Stakes and New Challenges" (with UNESCO, 2005), the Observatory's 1st and 2nd Medium Term Strategy and Plan of Action (2006 and 2011), the Compendium of basic reference texts for cultural policies in Africa (E/F/S, 2006 and 2009), the Guidelines for the Design and Evaluation of National Cultural Policies in Africa (2008 an 2009). The Proceedings of the International Symposium on Policies, Strategies and Experiences in Financing Culture in Africa was published in 2010, the Manual for Training Specialist of Cultural Policy and Management in Africa and the book on the Contribution of Culture to Poverty reduction in Africa were produced in 2013. More recently, in 2019, OCPA published with the support of UNESCO a book entitled Intercultural and Interreligious Dialogue: An African Experience as well as the book prepared and published with the support of Africalia on "Anticipating Cultural Policies in Africa by 2030".

B. News, events and projects in Africa

B.1 Zambia: The National Arts Festival (22 - 30 September 2023)

The Ministry of Youth, Sport and Arts facilitates the development of Art in the country in line with the Eighth National Development Plan whose theme is 'socio-economic transformation for improved livelihoods.' It puts Zambia on the path to accelerated economic recovery and through job creation for the Zambian people taking into account the contribution that the arts sector can make towards this aspiration.

The National Arts Festival (NAF) was first held in 2022 under the theme 'We Are One.' The Festival is a national celebration of Zambia's rich artistic talent whose aim is to showcase the best of Zambian arts as expressed and experienced by the country. The festival embraces the Zambian long-standing belief in the unity of purpose, unity as a nation, and unity in diversity. The festival comprises Zambian Artists' performances in music, theatre, film, dance, visual arts, crafts, fashion and digital arts.

The festival is staged on the principles of national identity, creativity, patriotism, and excellence. It is, therefore, a celebration that draws the past, present and future of Zambia's artistic resources as espoused by the creativities of the present day coupled with impact, entertainment and the business of the arts.

The 2023 Festival was commemorated with the involvement of other countries especially around the region, who will also showcase their various art forms expressed and experienced in their respective countries. Its theme was "Accelerating Economic Development Through Investment in the Creative Sector.

B.2 Morocco: The 22nd anniversary of the historic Royal Speech of Ajdir (Khénifra)

The Esprit Ajdir Atlas Foundation organized a series of cultural activities in commemoration of the 22nd anniversary of the Royal Historical Speech of Ajdir, a landmark historical milestone in the development and promotion of Amazigh culture as a component of national identity.

In a statement, the president of the Esprit Ajdir Khénifra Foundation, Mohamed Yassine, highlighted the historical scope of the Ajdir region as well as the strategic depth of the royal speech of Ajdir of October 17, 2001. He further indicated that Ajdir's historical speech constitutes a strategic horizon for the institution, which works to mature research in everything relating to Amazigh matters in the province of Khénifra, recalling that this edition allows the festival to further develop the attractiveness of the city and the region.

The festival program, which will take place over three days from October 16 to 18 in Ajdir and Khenifra, includes several symbolic activities, highlighting the characteristics of solidarity and synergy in Amazigh culture in the province of Khenifra and the Middle Atlas.

B.3 Africa: 12th session of COMIAC (Dakar, October 16 – 18, 2023)

COMIAC is an organization of the OIC, responsible for supervising and evaluating programs and projects related to information, culture, dialogue of civilizations, tourism and youth.

It meets every two years in the presence of the ministers concerned, in the member states of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation.

The participants examined the reports of the General Secretariat and the COMIAC Coordination Office in the field of information and culture. They also discussed issues related to information, culture, the issue of Al-Quds Al-Sharif and Palestine and the protection of Islamic holy sites.

In a speech read on his behalf by Samira El Malizi, Secretary General of the Ministry of Youth, Culture and Communication (dep. of culture), during the 12th session of the Standing Committee for Information and Affairs, under the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC), Mr. Bensaid highlighted Morocco's efforts to strengthen dialogue between civilizations and cultures and preserve the cultural identity of Al-Quds.

In this regard, Mr. Bensaid recalled that Morocco has hosted African, Islamic and international conferences, seminars and forums linked in particular to the dialogue of civilizations and religions, organized under the High Patronage of HM King Mohammed VI, such as the 9th Global Forum of the Alliance of Civilizations in November 2022 in Fez, and the Parliamentary Conference on Interfaith Dialogue in June, held in close cooperation with the United Nations Alliance of Civilizations.

B.4 Senegal: Podor - Start of construction of an Islamic and cultural complex

A project to build an Islamic and cultural complex including a museum, a mosque and a university, of which Cheikh Oumar Foutiyou Tall is the godfather, was launched in Podor.

The reconstruction of the Thioffy mosque, more than seventy years old, the construction of a house for visitors to the city and a morgue are part of the first phase of the project, according to the president of the Association for the creation of the Islamic and cultural complex of Podor, Ousmane Kane.

In addition to the mosque, the complex will eventually house a modern "daara" (Koranic school), a museum, a cultural and research center. A university, which will bear the name of Cheikh Oumar Foutiyou Tall, will also be built, according to project managers. It is planned to equip the complex with a renewable energy station (solar and biomass), according to a note given to the press during the general assembly.

B.5 Cameroon: Festival "Ecrans Noirs" brings communities together through cinema

Twenty-four African countries are taking part in the 27th edition of the "Ecrans Noirs" festival in Yaoundé (October 12-21), whose program includes several panels and film screenings, with the ambition of contributing to intensifying relationships between communities.

"The festival started in a very good way because we received congratulations from everywhere after the opening ceremony of the 27th edition, on October 12," declared the general delegate of the festival, Bassek Ba Kobhio, referring to "the presence from 24 African countries in competition and more than 200 people invited, panelists and actors among others.

The screening of "Borom Sarret" (The Carter), first short film by Senegalese director Ousmane Sembène produced in 1963, was the attraction during the opening ceremony of this edition of which Senegal is the guest country of honor, said he.

He recalled that this event wanted to serve as a "link" between different countries and people to intensify relations between communities. "The festival is not only about showing films, but it is also about intensifying relationships between peoples and magnifying them," he indicated, welcoming, to this end, "the good relationships maintained Senegal and Cameroon. A day dedicated to Senegal has been scheduled with a tribute to the filmmaker Ousmane Sembène, whose centenary of birth we are celebrating this year.

In a world marked by a multitude of challenges and a general questioning of freedoms, it becomes imperative to reflect on the role of the arts in the quest for freedom. The objective of this conference is therefore to encourage the reflection of artists, researchers, educators and all social actors on questions linked to individual and collective freedoms in relation to the arts and artistic creation.

In addition to the conference, the Festival program also included professional meetings and training, notably journalistic writing workshops, documentary theater workshops, visual arts workshops, physical art workshops.

C. News about cultural policies, institutions and resources in Africa

C.1 Declaration of the 12th ICESCO Conference of Ministers of Culture adopted (Doha)

The Declaration was approved by the 12th Conference of Ministers of Culture in the Islamic world, organized by the Islamic World Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (ICESCO) and hosted by the State of Qatar, represented by the Ministry of Culture, in Doha.

It features several recommendations on renewing cultural action, protecting and valorizing heritage in the Islamic World, enhancing the role of cultural economy in achieving Sustainable Development Goals.

The Doha Declaration commended ICESCO's initiatives in the fields of heritage protection, preservation, and valorization, the generalization of cultural economy mechanisms and strategies, the establishment of the violet economy concept and sustainable cultural markets, and unification and development of cultural indicators in the Islamic World. It also supported for the Organization's initiative to set an 18th development goal to be added to the SDGs by 2030, fort enhancing the role of culture in development.

The Declaration welcomed the two initiatives of Saudi Arabia, namely the launch of the "Culture Index in the Islamic World" Project, in partnership with ICESCO, and the "Hajj Routes" Program to be launched in collaboration between the Saudi Ministry of Culture, ICESCO, and the Saudi National Committee.

On the closing day, Sheikh Abdulrahman bin Hamad Al Thani, the Minister of Culture of the State of Qatar and president of the Conference, expressed his appreciation to ICESCO for the successful preparation for the Conference as well as for its support to innovative cultural initiatives in its Member States.

During the third working session, the heads of the delegation delivered their remarks, fostering an exchange of insights, engaging in constructive discussions aimed at renewing cultural action in the Islamic world, and reaching a consensus on the necessary methods and mechanisms for achieving this goal.

C.2 Morocco Can Become Driving Force in Cultural, Creative Industries, Says Minister

Morocco has all the essential assets to become a driving force in the world's cultural and creative industries (CCI), said the Minister of Culture, Youth and Communication, Mohamed Mehdi Bensaid, in Benguerir.

"We have a young population, a heritage, cultural pluralism and an ability to manage difference and innovation, and above all we have the ambition and the will," stressed Bensaid at the opening of a conference on creative industries in Africa. CCIs are a means of turning culture and heritage into a dynamic force for creating wealth, jobs and social ties, "our challenge is to become major players in CCIs."

Neila Tazi, President of the Moroccan Federation of Cultural Industries, pointed out that the FICC and the ministry of the sector are working closely together within the framework of a public-private agreement aimed at strengthening the ecosystem of these industries, describing this partnership as "exemplary".

Organized jointly by the IFC and Mohammed VI Polytechnic University, this event highlights the importance of cultural and creative industries as a driver of economic and social development.

C.3 Tanzania: Protect Content Creators' Rights - Minister

IN the pursuit of preserving and protecting content creators' efforts to enhance their environment, the government has urged its institutions to preserve and protect the role of art in cultural and national identity.

A special emphasis was placed on on the Copyright Society of Tanzania, which has a crucial role in addressing copyright and intellectual property rights for Tanzanian content creators.

The call was made by the Minister for Culture, Arts and Sports, Damas Ndumbaro, during his working visit to the COSOTA and National Arts Council offices in Dar es Salaam.

He urged the institutions to cooperate in the pursuit of two cases: figuring out who owns the copyright to the famous song 'Malaika Nakupenda', and determining how the benefit should be distributed to the painters of African folk tales and Tanzanian art 'Tinga Tinga Tales'.

COSOTA Chief Executive Officer, Doreen Sinare, thanked the minister for paying a visit to her institution, insisting that they would work on his directives to ensure artists and content creators get all benefits they deserve from their work of art.

C.4 Nigeria: Federal Govt to Launch U.S.\$617 Million Investment in Digital, Creative Enterprises

Determined to deliver on the promise to create millions of jobs in the technology space, President Bola Ahmed Tinubu's administration has proposed November 2023 to launch the \$617.7 million Investment in Digital and Creative Enterprises (i-DICE) programme.

To ensure this unfolds into a reality, Vice President Kashim Shettima has given an order to members of the i-DICE Steering Committee to make sure the programme starts before the end of November this year. At the meeting, Sen. Shettima emphasised the importance of the initiative to the federal government's digital jobs drive, saying the administration was keen on delivering on its promises to Nigerians.

Minister of Communications, Innovation and Digital Economy, Mr Bosun Tijjani, said the scheme is a unique opportunity as "The Nigerian creative ecosystem is the best on the continent."

C.5 Angola: Cultural industries can contribute to the diversification of the economy

The Secretary of State for Culture, Maria da Piedade assured that cultural industries could constitute a positive branch for contributing to the diversification of the economy in the country. She made this statement during the seminar on the protection of intellectual property through the copyright and related rights system in the culture and tourism sector.

The Ministry of Culture and Tourism carried out actions to promote historical and cultural heritage as well as the development of cultural and creative industries.

The cultural and creative industries generate intellectual property because they have their origins in individual creativity, skill and talent. "It is through the development of the exploitation of this intellectual property that we create wealth for families, businesses and the State."

According to Maria da Piedade, intangible assets, based on creativity and values, are often at the center of conflicts. For this reason, she stressed that the protection of intellectual property

constitutes an incentive for creative, innovative activities, an instrument at the service of the cultural industries. The limited knowledge of society on intellectual property issues, as well as the lack of knowledge of the forms and mechanisms of management and defense of copyright by creators and entrepreneurs are challenges to be overcome.

C.6 Kenya: Govt Pursuing Policies to Harness Cultural Asset Potential

President William Ruto said cultural assets will be instrumental in enhancing cohesion and stimulating economic growth. He noted that focus on culture will propel cultural industries, creative economy and tourism and expand opportunities for the youth.

"Our Plan identifies the creative economy as well as culture and heritage to be highly promising drivers of transformation and employment creation," he said.

To achieve this, President Ruto said, the Government is implementing robust legislative bills including the Culture Bill that was approved by the Cabinet last week. "Others like the Creative Economy Framework, National Kiswahili Council of Kenya Bill, the Kenya Film Bill, the National Heritage and Museums Bill, are currently being developed," he said.

He made the remarks during the Turkana Cultural and Tourism Festival in Lodwar town, which brought together members of the community from South Sudan, Uganda and Ethiopia.

The President observed that the festival has promoted peace and security and deepened regional integration and cooperation. He said the Government will spend Ksh 800 million to enhance electricity connectivity in Turkana County, to spur economic growth.

The National Police Reserve, he added, will help the police to manage the security of the region.

D.3 Why the next world fashion capital will be African: UNESCO launches a new report

What if the next world fashion capital was African? From the production of raw materials to a vibrant couture scene, from traditional know-how to the manufacturing of high street fashion: Africa is full of opportunities to lead the fashion sector in the coming decades, according to a new UNESCO report. It was presented to the press on Wednesday 18 October, a week before its official launch by Audrey Azoulay, Director-General of UNESCO, at Lagos fashion week.

UNESCO's report "The African fashion sector: Trends, challenges & opportunities for growth" provides the first comprehensive overview of textiles production, accessories and fine crafts, garments and high fashion in Africa.

It explains how the sector can stimulate job creation, women's empowerment, and economic diversification on the continent. It also sets out concrete recommendations on how African governments can ensure the sustainable growth of African fashion, support new creative talent and traditional textiles producers, and encourage ethical manufacturing and design.

The Organization's commitment to fostering a dynamic creative economy in Africa aligns with the principles set out in the UNESCO Convention on the Protection and Promotion of the Diversity of Cultural Expressions. It has led to a series of reports on the strategic importance of cultural and creative industries in Africa, starting with a report on African Cinema published in 2021, *The African film Industry: trends, challenges and opportunities for growth*.

D.4 Cinema: UNESCO opens up a global debate on the impact of AI

On 19 October, UNESCO hosted the first UN conference on the impact of AI on filmmakers and the film industry, giving the floor to directors, productors, actors and AI experts.

Recent heated discussions between Hollywood studios and actors highlighted that the use of generative artificial intelligence in cinema raises questions and concerns among many professionals in the sector.

On Thursday 19 October, the panelists initiated the development of clear ethical guidelines for the use of AI in film production and other cultural and creative sectors, building on existing UNESCO principles on AI and creativity.

They explored potential mechanisms to uphold intellectual property rights, put in place equitable revenue distribution for cultural content produced with AI, ensured that cultural diversity and representation are considered when AI is used to create or distribute film content, and strike a balance between harnessing the potential of AI for innovation and creativity and addressing the ethical and societal concerns it raises.

In 2021, UNESCO established the first-ever global framework on AI ethics, the Recommendation on the Ethics of Artificial Intelligence, which was adopted unanimously by its Member States.

F.1 News from the International Federation of Arts Councils and Cultural Agencies (IFACCA – ACORNS)

In Focus: The World Heritage

As reported in the previous issue of OCPA News, the extended 45th session of the UNESCO World Heritage Committee held in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia in late September marked a significant milestone, as it witnessed the largest number of inscriptions from Africa during a single Committee session since 1982. In a bid to manage overtourism and better protect its historic landscapes and monuments, the Greek Ministry of Culture has implemented a daily cap of 20,000 visitors to the Acropolis, effective from early September 2023, while Venice will begin charging some visitors a fee on high-traffic days next year.

Culture also found recognition in **the** <u>political declaration</u> made by world leaders **at the 2023 United Nations General Assembly** for expediting progress on the 17 Sustainable Development Goals and for for reaffirming in the UN 2030 Agenda irms the role of culture as an enabler of sustainable development.

Among the important initiatives we need to mention also the <u>Right to Culture: International Cultural Policy Conference</u>, which took place on 5 October in Valletta, Malta and the preparation of the sixth edition of <u>Culture Summit 2023</u> in Abu Dhabi, being organised by the Department of Culture and Tourism (DCT) and its international partners from the 29th to the 31st of October 2023 under the theme 'A Matter of Time'.

In the meantime EU countries approved the Cáceres Declaration for culture to become the 18th SDG and The African Research Universities Alliance (ARUA) and The Guild of European Research-Intensive Universities (The Guild) have launched a new Africa-Europe Clusters of Research Excellence (CoRE) on Creative Economies: Cultures, Innovation and Sustainability.
