A. News from OCPA

The month of February will have been used by the secretariat for a technical preparation of the events forseen during the year 2018.

A.1 Preparation for the participation of OCPA in the 2018 edition of the MASA

The OCPA is preparing for a substantial participation in the 2018 edition of the MASA (Marché des Arts du Spectacle Africain/Market for African Performing Arts) in Abidjan from March 10 to 18 and will play a special role in the animation of the professional meetings. In a special way, the OCPA will give special support to the meeting of the Executive Board of the International Music Council, which will hold its session in this context on March 16 and 17, preceded the day before, on the 15th, by a meeting with different structures. cultural and artistic African.

A.2 Preparation for participation in the Round Table on the Performing Arts

In the framework of MASA, the CERAV (Regional Center for the Living Arts, Bobo Dioulasso, Burkina Faso) and the International Institute of Theater ITI, Paris) will organize a round table devoted to the performing arts. The Executive Director of OCPA will participate in the opening of this meeting with a keynote address on the African performing arts and the global market.

A.3 Preparation of the 1st International Conference on Oral History of Mozambique

In preparation for the first international conference on oral history in Mozambique scheduled for November 14-16, 2018, organized by OCPA by the Ministry of Culture and Tourism, the OCPA proceeded during the month of February, at the appointment of the members of the Scientific Council of the Conference. This includes, in addition to high-level experts from Mozambican universities (including Eduardo Mondlane University, Zambezi University, Lurio University) representatives of specialized centers in Africa, including CODESRIA,

CERDOTOLA and CELHTO, as well as specialists from guest area of the Universities of Brazil and Portugal. More details on the conference will be given in future editions.

A.4 Workshop on the Implementation of the African Cultural Renaissance Charter

Successful exchanges took place between the African Union Commission and the OCPA which resulted in the decision of the very forthcoming organization of an African Union Workshop in Maputo in May 2018, on the strategy and program for the effective implementation of the African Cultural Renaissance Charter. B.1 The First Pan-African Writers Conference of the African Union (Accra, 7 – 9 March)

Organized in Accra, Ghana from 7 to 9 March 2018 in collaboration with the Pan-African Association of Writers and the Thabo Mbeki Federation, this meeting of writers from the African continent is envisaged as "a forum for debate on the major opportunities and challenges of African literary works in contributing to the socio-cultural development of the continent".

The theme proposed for this occasion is "Promoting African Literature and Reading: the Role of African Literary Authors in Strengthening African Identity: Shared Values and Integration".

It is about: transcending all forms of primitive ethnicism to promote the representation and promotion of the Bantu identity in its most eminent light, while combining meaning and content, material production, intellectual and spiritual.

This reflection will allow us to put into perspective, through such a meeting, the values that are supposed to found the unity and integration of Africa.

B.2 Tunisia: 4th Arab Publishers' Conference (Tunis, 9 and 10 January 2018)

This conference was held by the Arab Publishers' Union under the title "Books and publishing in the Arab world: Reality and Prospects". A number of academics and publishers from 14 different Arab and European countries attended the conference, which was followed by a seminar on the role of books and publishing in the development of Arab culture, presented to ministers of cultural affairs in the Arab world.

During the conference, participants identified current problems in the field, including rising illiteracy rates, the reluctance of intellectuals to read, the proliferation of fraud and intellectual property infringement, a lack of development in public libraries, and propensity for Arab countries to designate meagre budgets to their literature and publishing sectors.

C.1 Lenn Eugene Nagbe, Liberia's Minister of Information, Cultural Affairs and Tourism

In the new government of Liberia designated on 26 January 2018 there are some politicians who have already been in the last Government of the former president Ellen Johnson Sirleaf. One among them is the Minister of Information, Cultural Affairs and Tourism (MICAT), Lenn Eugene Nagbe who, in the field of culture, is expected to solve the following main tasks:

- replacement of the Kendeja Cultural Village, built in 1960, damaged during the civil war.
- implementation of reforms that will stop the downplaying of the country's culture and its replacement with the propagation of foreign cultures.
- renovation of the National Museum.
- construction of the Behsao National Culture Center, Liberia's second cultural village.
- launching of an annual cultural festival for promoting the national cultural heritage.
- protection of the authors' rights of the Liberian artists and musicians.
- development of the tourism industry.

C.2 The Zambian Ministry of Tourism and Art

Created in 2011 when the sector of culture was separated from the Traditional Affairs in order to improve the coordination between tourism and culture, the Ministry is mandated to coordinate the development of the following fields: Arts and Culture Policies and Centers, Culture industries, Museums, National Heritage and Arts Research. The Ministry is also responsible for cultural statutory bodies like the National Heritage Conservation Commission, the National Museum Board and the National Arts Council.

The vision of the Ministry is "To be a destination of choice with unique features thriving on well conserved natural resources, cultural heritage and creative industries that significantly contribute to employment creation, sustainable economic growth and poverty reduction by 2030". The Ministry is also expected "To facilitate and promote sustainable tourism and arts development and, culture preservation for socio-economic development".

The tasks of the Ministry headed by Hon. Charles Banda, Minister of Tourism and Arts are to

- provide policy frameworks and efficient administrative services for the preservation and development of the arts and culture;
- co-ordinate the rehabilitation and construction of arts and culture infrastructure;
- promote research, investments, marketing and product development in arts and culture in order to contribute to employment and wealth creation;
- effectively develop human resources through professional training and improve organizational performance for the effective sustainable development of the sector;
- promote bilateral and multilateral cooperation in arts and culture;
- monitor and evaluate the implementation of the 2014 sectoral cultural policy.

And if there are any particular initiatives to take, it will be necessary to find a way to disseminate his production more widely in order to allow the younger generations to know this true source of inspiration.

C.5 Chad - Djibert Younous Replaces Mahamat Saleh Haroun as new Minister of Culture

D.3 International Mother Language Day 21 February

In 2018 the International Mother Language Day is dedicated to the theme: Linguistic diversity and multilingualism count for sustainable development.

Languages, with their implications for identity, communication, social integration, education and development, are of strategic importance for the peoples. Yet, due to globalization processes, they are increasingly under threat, or disappearing.

More than 50 per cent of the approximately 7,000 languages spoken in the world are likely to die out within a few generations, and 96 per cent of these languages are spoken by a mere 4 per cent of the world's population. Only a few hundred languages have been given pride of place in education systems and the public domain, and less than a hundred are used in the digital world.

International Mother Language Day has been observed every year since February 2000 to promote linguistic and cultural diversity and multilingualism.

Languages are the most powerful instruments of preserving and developing our tangible and intangible heritage. All moves to promote the dissemination of mother tongues will serve not only to encourage linguistic diversity and multilingual education.

D.4 Capitals of Culture: An Introductory Survey of a Worldwide Activity, October 2017

Whilst the European Capitals of Culture (ECOC) programme has generated a substantial library of evaluations, theses, reports, articles commentaries etc., very little has been written about the other programmes. This paper, written by Steve Green, a former chair of the selection panel for the European Capitals of Culture (including for Rijeka 2020), gives an introduction to the Capitals and Cities of Culture programmes around the world.

This paper is an introductory survey of 31 titles. Some have closed, but in 2017 there are 23 cities around the world with a Capital of Culture title. They join over 300 cities which have held titles since 1985 and over 50 cities are already designated to hold titles to 2025.

According to Steve Green, this paper just outlines the programmes and shows that more information and research is needed on the Capitals of Culture programmes around the world. Thus, the author welcomes more information on titles and will keep the paper up to date.

D.5 Davos 2018 Conference of European Ministers of Culture (Davos, Switzerland)

Held just before the annual World Economic Forum in Davos, from 20 to 22 January 2018, the Conference discussed the theme "Towards a high-quality Baukultur for Europe" with Baukultur defined as, "embracing every human activity that changes the built environment."

It adopted the Davos Declaration, which elaborates the definition of Baukultur as follows: "The whole built environment, including every designed and built asset that is embedded in and relates to the natural environment, is to be understood as a single entity. Baukultur encompasses existing buildings, including monuments and other elements of the cultural heritage, as well as the construction of contemporary building, infrastructure, public spaces and landscapes."

The Davos Declaration emphasises the central role of culture in the quality of our living environment. It reminds us that building is culture and creates space for culture. Taking a holistic approach, the joint responsibility of politics and society for the built environment is stressed and a European policy of achieving high-quality Baukultur is called for.

Jordan: Protests following a new sales tax in publishing sector

The Jordanian Publishers' Union took a stand in front of the Union Headquarters in Amman on 23rd January in protest against the government's decision to impose a 10% sales tax on books. The protestors demanded the cancellation of the new sales tax. The protestors believed that the new tax will force many publishing houses out of business. According to statistics presented by Fathi Al-Biss, President of the Publishers' Union, 371 of 750 publishing houses licensed by the Media Commission have closed already, with 379 remaining active.

United Arab Emirates: The Sharjah Art Foundation (SAH) aims to support cinema

The SAH has launched a new annual initiative of production grants for 2 feature films and 3 short films, prizes, local film screenings, and a programme of workshops and round-table discussions. The aim is to support the art scene in the region by providing a platform for well-established and promising filmmakers, producers, critics, and students. Tunisia: A Humiliating Budget and the Stagnation of Creativity - By Habib Bel Hedi

In his article the Cultural Policy Group Coordinator for Tunisia presents his Comparative Conclusions on the Development of the Budget of the Ministry of Culture: It hasn't been long since Zine El Abidine Ben Ali promised in 2009 - shortly before his presidential bid on 14th January 2011 - to allocate 1% of the government's budget to culture. He kept his promise, adjusting the cultural budget for 2010, 2011, 2012, and 2013 and secured 1% for culture. In the wake of the revolution, the budget allocated to culture was around 1% of the final 2011 budget. However, the Troika then started chose other priorities, thereby reducing the budget allocation of culture to 0.63%. In so doing, it demonstrated how seriously it believed in the role of culture in general and in the democratic transition process, and showed how faithful it was to its own campaign promises. F.5 Nhimbe Trust Fund

Nhimbe Trust Launches U40 Cultural Leadership Programme

Nhimbe Trust launched this Programme in January 2018 to help develop the skills of potential leaders in the cultural sector. It was created in response to the difficulties many cultural organisations in Zimbabwe face in recruiting innovative local university graduates, with capacity to meet the industry s future needs.

The U40 Cultural Leadership Programme is a 3-year programme to promote excellence in leadership in the local creative/cultural industries and the cultural sector generally. A call for applications is issued annually for the programme, and successful applicants are drawn primarily, but not exclusively, from local university graduates or the cultural sector. They will be considered as exceptional individuals (or have demonstrated considerable potential). Fellows must be between 20-40 years. Although focused on Zimbabwean professionals, the Programme is open to others living in Africa provided they are able to secure sponsorship for their participation and be resident in Zimbabwe for a minimum period of six months.

In 2018, the programme selected Charmaine Mudau (24), who recently attained a Bachelor of Arts Honours degree in Language and Communication Studies with Lupane State University. She did her one-year industrial attachment period at the National Arts Council of Zimbabwe where she gained exceptional arts administration and events coordination skills. She is actively involved in the creative industry as an actress.

Mudau has been strongly involved with Nhimbe in the past, with the Schools Playwright Actors Academy (now Children in Theatre & Television CiTT) from which she later graduated to the Centre for Talent Development (CTD) until now. She was also part of the Unified Women Project which saw rich cultural exchange between Nhimbe Trust and Young Vic UK, held in Bulawayo in 2017. She has a wide understanding of creative industries, not only by her acquired academic knowledge, but her own strong interest and a serious passion for the arts. She has displayed extraordinary leadership potential which needs to be nurtured, and made her a prime candidate to become the inaugural Fellow for the Programme.

Charmaine says: This is a great learning opportunity and I feel honoured to be become the first Fellow of the programme. I hope to gain new skills in cultural leadership, from both local and international perspectives, through a broad range of networks and partners of Nhimbe in the field of culture and development.
